York County Boys' Grain Club

Of the five Boys' Clubs organized by the Agricultural Representative this year, three were Grain Clubs with a total membership of 63 boys. The club sponsored by the Woodbridge Agricultural Society had 14 boys growing various kinds of oats while the 49 boys in the Markham Agricultural Society's group were divided into two clubs with the boys trying out the new Vanguard oats in one club and the other club grew different varieties to suit their particular farms.

The fields were scored before harvest and samples of the threshed grain shown at their respective fall fairs and an unusually large percent of the members were threshed in time to show their grain. Of the 63 boys, 52 exhibited at the Fairs. The prizes were awarded in each group on the total scores of the boys, including the field score, score on grain exhibit, written examination, attendance at meetings, judging, field notes and financial statements.

Teams of two boys from each club were taken to the Ontario Agricultural College recently by W. M. Cockburn to compete with teams from the other counties in Ontario and of the 40 teams, the Markham Vanguard Club team consisting of Bruce Little, Agincourt and Donald Stewart of Agincourt, stood fourth. The other Markham team, Mac Freeman and Geo. McGowan of Milliken, stood fifth. The Woodbridge Club represented by Bert and Carman Livingston, stood tenth. Of the 80 boys entered, Bruce Little of Agincourt had the highest individual score, making 555 out of a possible 600 marks.
