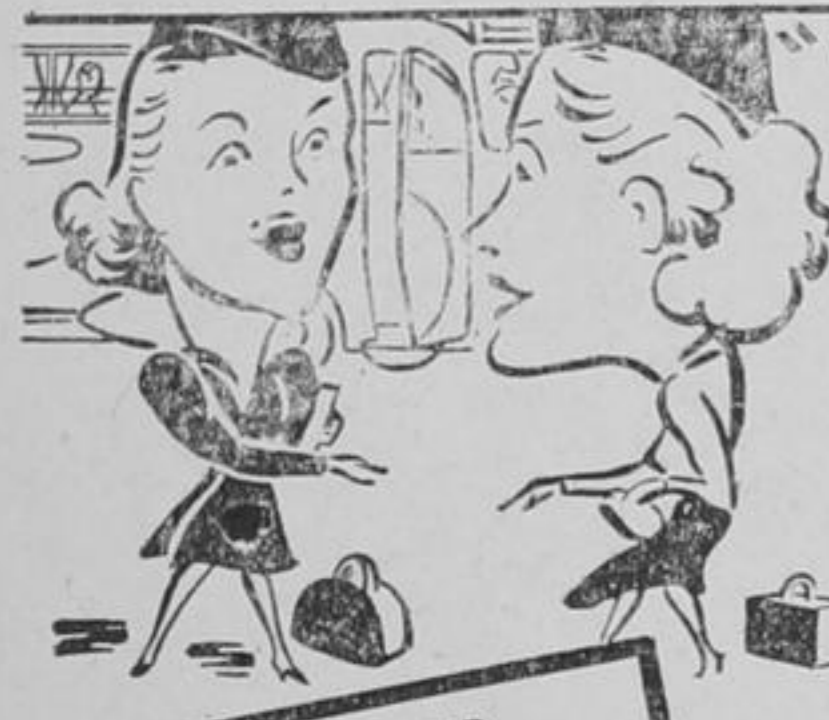

WEEKLY NEWS NOTES FROM THE UNIONVILLE DISTRICT

Unionville folk and of the surrounding community were shocked on Saturday morning to learn of the sudden passing of Mrs. W. Milliken Smith. Mrs. Smith had been spending a few days with her daughter Mrs. K. B. Heisey in Toronto returning to Unionville Thursday evening. Shortly after her arrival she suffered a severe heart attack and on Friday a recurrence which proved fatal.

Kate McKibbin Smith was born in Walton, Huron County of Northern Irish parentage and one of a family of 12. A graduate of Goderich Collegiate and the Model School, she trained for school teaching and came to Markham Township to teach in the German Mills school. While here she became acquainted with and afterwards married William M. Smith who was associated with the Toronto World as Livestock editor and afterwards on the Suburban staff of the Evening Telegram. After Mr. Smith's death nine years ago, Mrs. Smith continued this work in the Unionville and Markham district.

Although having a home in Toronto, Mrs. Smith found much happiness in the association with old friends in Unionville and spent much of her time here especially during the summer months. She will be greatly missed for her genial hospitality, her kindly gracious personality winning many friends.

Surviving her are her daughter, Alice, Mrs. K. B. Heisey, three grandsons, Alan, Lawrence and Karl B.; and two sisters, Mrs. Hugh Campbell of Clinton and Miss I. R. McKibbin of the Globe and Mail's Home-maker department.

The funeral service was held in Miles Funeral Chapel on Monday afternoon. Rev. J. E. Todd of St. Clair United Church and Rev. Frank Rae, a former pastor, officiating. Interment followed in the family plot at Hagerman. The pallbearers were four nephews, Dr. Harold Armstrong, W. Glen Armstrong, Thos. W. Armstrong, C. G. Walker, Major Bert S. Wemp and K. L. G. Bailey. Among those attending the funeral were C. O. Knowles, Editor of the Telegram, H. H. Ball, School Trustee Mrs. G. Robinson, David Kissock, Percy T.
