Gets Two Months Markham Council For Relief Fraud Inaugural Meeting

Charles Holmes of Garden Avenue, Vaughan Township has been sentenced to two months in jail after being found guilty of charges arising out of relief fraud. Mrs. Rose Bugg, charged jointly with Holmes, was remanded for sentence. The couple have been in receipt of relief for some time, and charges arose out of the discovery of a regular income received by Mrs. Bugg not accounted for in sworn statements made by Holmes to relief officials of the township. All those in receipt of municipal relief are now required by regulations to make a sworn statement of their income covering a considerable period. These statements are carefully checked by investigators and as was evidenced by this case those making false statements will be severely dealt with.
