Also that during the year the pastor had served communion to twenty-two members in their homes.

The officials of the church are deeply appreciative of the splendid contribution made by the ladies toward such an enjoyable evening.

## SPLENDID WORK OF RICHMOND HILL RED CROSS SOCIETY SHOWN IN THE REPORTS AT THE ANNUAL MEETING

Mrs. P. C. Hill Re-Elected President—Financial Statement Shows \$726.57 Raised For War Work in Four Months

**Report of Annual Meeting**  
The annual meeting of the Richmond Hill Red Cross Society was held in the Red Cross Work Room on Thursday evening, January 25th at 8 p.m., Mrs. P. C. Hill, the president, presiding. In a short address Mrs. Hill gave a resume of the past four and a half months' work and thanked the executive and members for their helpful co-operation since the organization of the society. Mrs. Hill reported four shipments of socks and hospital supplies sent to headquarters, three Christmas boxes sent overseas, and mentioned many acts of service given freely by members and friends of the society.

Mrs. Hill reported \$455.71 spent on wool, \$207.52 spent on sewing supplies. Complete receipts to Jan. 25th, \$915.94. Complete expenses, \$841.08, leaving a bank balance of \$74.86.

Mrs. J. Curzon, knitting convener, reported 165 pairs of socks, 14 pairs of wristlets, 7 scarves and 3 sweaters shipped to headquarters. 8 pairs socks have been given out to local boys and the supply of knitted articles completed ready for shipment consists of 22 pairs of socks, 9 wristlets, 4 pairs of half mitts, 3 scarves and 1 Balalacla cap. There is a supply of 210 lbs. of wool on hand, purchased before the last rise in the price of wool.

Mrs. Tuck, convener of sewing, reported fifteen bolts of material purchased at a cost of \$207.52. From this 517 articles, including gowns, pyjamas, pillow cases, triangles, towels and sheets have been made, and 473 of these articles have already been sent to headquarters.

Mrs. McLatchy presented the following treasurer's report showing the receipts and expenditures of the society up to December 31st, 1939. (It might be noted in passing that total receipts to December 31 were \$726.57, and not, as incorrectly appeared in the Monday evening edition of the Daily Star, a balance on hand of \$726.57.)

## SCHOMBERG SHORT COURSE CLASSES

The classes in Agriculture and Home Economics conducted by the York County branch of the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture at Schomberg during the month of January, concluded their four weeks of study with a banquet on Friday evening, January 26th. Cockburn, Agricultural Representative for York County, who was in charge of the course, announced that there was a total enrolment of 102 with 67 in the boys' class and 35 in the girls' class and that despite cold weather, the boys had an average attendance of 53 and the girls 30. This is an unusually high average for a course of this nature and was the largest in the Province.
