Liberals to Hold Nomination Meeting Saturday, Feb. 17th

Col. W. P. Mulock Will Again Be The Candidate

The news of the sudden illness and passing of Lord Tweedsmuir held the front page during the present week and the nation-wide sorrow occasioned by his passing curtailed election campaign activities throughout the country. In North York the election campaign will formally get under way Saturday when the Liberal nomination meeting will be held at the Town Hall, Newmarket. The nomination will be tendered to Col. W. P. Mulock, the sitting member who by his outstanding service and devoted attention to the interests of the riding has won general recognition as an outstanding representative. The formal proceeding of the annual meeting of the Liberal Association and the nomination will start at 2.30 p.m. and at 3.30 a public meeting will be held when Col. Mulock and Morgan Baker, M.P.P., will be the speakers. Everyone is cordially invited to attend. To date the only opposition to Col. Mulock's candidature is the Rev. Dix of Truro, Nova Scotia, nominated last week at the Conservative convention at Newmarket. Last election the Rev. Dix was a Stevens Reconstruction candidate. While there have been rumors of the C.C.F. having a candidate, no nomination meeting has yet been announced.
