Scenes I Have Visited

During the summer of 1932 it was my privilege to visit various parts of Europe on a conducted tour. If requested to name the three places visited where I would prefer to take up residence in the nine European countries over which we rambled I would unhesitatingly say London, England, Lucerne, Switzerland and Florence, Italy.

There is not to be found in all Europe a lake more complete and perfect in the magnificence of its mountain scenery, the peaceful quiet beauty of its shore lines, the great variety of its charms and the poetry of its legends than Lake Lucerne. It is the shape of a cross and is about 23 miles long and one to two miles wide. Travellers thrill over the blue waters of the Mediterranean but they are hardly comparable in point of beauty with the sheet of blue glass spread over the deep caverns of Lake Lucerne.

Lucerne, one of the largest centres of population in Switzerland, is situated on the western extremity of the lake which bears its name, on the Reuss River. By taking a bus for five minutes and going up the Alben and Nurich streets one comes to the greatest curiosity of this place—the Lion of Lucerne. It was hewn out of the solid sandstone rock in 1821 by Aborn of Constance in commemoration of 26 officers and 700 soldiers of the Swiss Guard who died in defending the Royal Family of France on August 10th, 1792. This colossal piece of sculpture is 28 feet long and 18 feet high. It represents a dying lion protecting the shield of the Peurtona in the agony of death with a broken spear pier-

ing its side. It is placed amid exceptionally beautiful surroundings with ivy and other creeping plants. From the rock beside it a mountain stream—gorgeous in its array of colors when the sun shines brightly—leaps down to a pool below where the image of the Lion is reflected in its clear waters. It is a glorious sight never to be forgotten. A short distance removed is a model of the Lion sculptured by a Dane Thorwaldsen and the Chapel Expiatore where annually on August 10th a special service is inaugurated to commemorate the heroism of the slain. The altar cloth is the production of the daughter of Louis XVI, the last survivor of the terrible scene.

WOODBIDGE SCHOOL BOARD PROPOSE \$2500 ADDITION

Woodbridge Council deferred a formal sanctioning of the proposal when the School Board appeared at council session Monday requesting \$2500 to erect a school addition and install sanitary conveniences. Reeve N. George Wallace intimated that the request would be granted when the board appears before the next session with detailed plans.

A lengthy discussion centred around the school board's proposal to dispense with professional architectural services as an economy measure, and to omit wash basins from the proposed addition.

Councilman W. R. Scott questioned the advisability of erecting such a structure without some inspection or guarantee. He was supported by Reeve Wallace who advocated establishment of a municipal plumbing inspection department.
