After the fruit is ripe the maggot comes out and goes into the ground where it remains until June or July of the following year.

They also breed in haw trees. The first step in control is to see that all wild apple trees and haws are cut down. The time to do this is winter or early spring. Sprays should also be used and a late spray used to kill the late emerging flies. May we draw the attention of all property owners to the above paragraph and ask them to co-operate with the society in the control of
