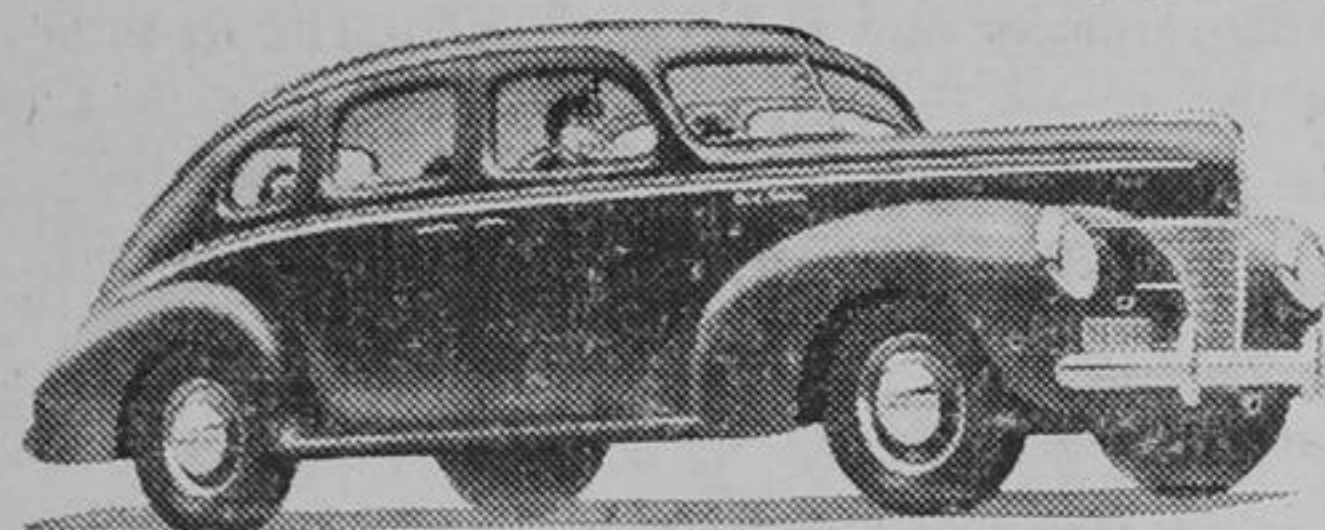

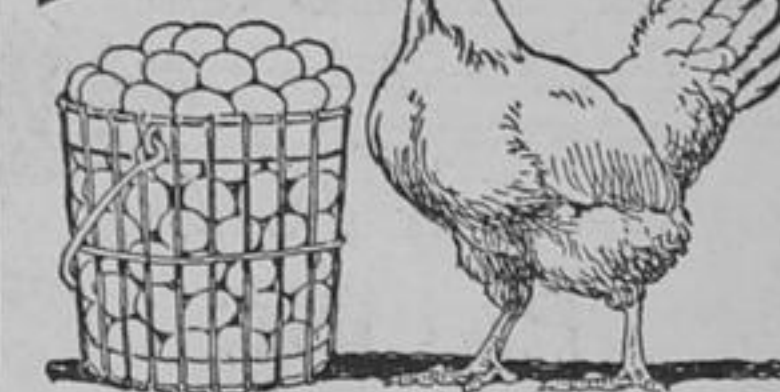
The men of the church are planning to hold a St. Patrick's Irish Stew in the church next Monday evening.
