## Bill Mulock His Record of Service Merits Support.

### Enthusiastic Meeting for Mulock Held at Richvale

The chief men in the Quebec Duplessis machine of yesterday are the Manion national candidates in Quebec today, Col. W. P. Mulock, Liberal candidate in North York, told a meeting at Richvale on Tuesday night. He asked how such a combination could expect the people of Canada to believe that it was fit to prosecute the war.

Col. Mulock read a list of men who, he said, were campaign managers, organizers and other links in the Quebec machine which actively opposed Canada's participation in the war. Today every one of these men is a Manion candidate, he said. "And the Tories talk about scuttling," said Col. Mulock. "Why, they've been scuttled without their own consent. There was no convention called to scuttle the party. It was scuttled from the top. That may be democracy, but it tastes of central Europe."

"A united war effort is needed in this crisis and the way to get that is to return a Liberal administration in which Ernest Lapointe and 'Chubby' Power represent Quebec," said Col. Mulock.

Branding stories of soldiers voting for National government as "just wishful thinking," Col. Mulock said he had definite information showing the Mackenzie King government would have a clear majority in the next parliament.

A. W. Skelly, president of North York Veterans' association, said it was "inconceivable" that any veteran would vote against Col. Mulock.

"In my own municipality of North York township there is not one eligible wife or mother who is not getting separation allowance," said Mr. Skelly. He said Col. Mulock had done more for veterans in the riding than anyone else.

Col. Mulock gave a detailed description of the state of Canada's defences under the Bennett government to show that the Mackenzie King administration had made vast improvements. As proof that politics did not enter into the government's war effort, he cited the appointment of Wallace Campbell, "a Conservative", to the war supply board; Col. Goodwin Gibson, "a Con-

servative", as adviser in real estate matters, and General McNaughton as commander of the first Canadian division.

"The people aren't going to vote for a pig in a poke," said Col. Mulock. "They aren't being told who the brain trust are that Dr. Manion will put in charge. Nobody knows who they are."

Mr. J. Koning acted as chairman.
