#### SALVATION DOUGHNUTS

Since Canada's entry into the present war, The Salvation Army has been busily engaged in establishing its various war services which every soldier in the Great War recalls with such pleasant memories.

The present European conflict brings many demands for war service to The Salvation Army and many of these services have had to be adapted to meet new war conditions.

But to soldiers in this war a cup of hot coffee and a crisp, fluffy doughnut are just as necessary as they were to the first of the "Old Contemptibles" who set foot on the shores of France and to every allied soldier who fought in the 1914-1918 war.

Complying with many requests for the doughnut recipe used by The Salvation Army with the Canadian Expeditionary Force 25 years ago, the most popular of three recipes has been released and is given below. It must be remembered that all the ingredients were not always available under difficult conditions at the front, or even at home, and consequently the recipe varied with nearly every batch.

These changes did not worry the soldiers, however, for they always insisted that The Salvation Army added "a little religion and a little love" to each batch of doughnuts, which made up for any culinary shortcomings.

#### Salvation Doughnuts

One cup of sugar beaten with 3 eggs, add cup of milk, 2 tablespoons of melted butter and 1/2 teaspoon of lemon extract. Put a cup of flour in sifter and add 3 heaping teaspoons of baking powder, 1 teaspoon of salt and 1/4 teaspoon of finely grated nutmeg. Sift into liquid and beat well together, adding enough flour to make a dough that can be rolled and handled, but not too stiff. Cut and fry in leafing point. Cover with powdered lard, keeping the fat at almost boiling sugar.

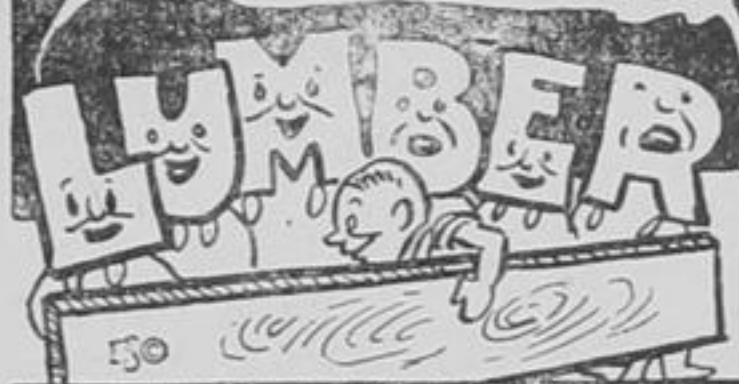
