

Official Figures Give Mulock Majority 1815 in North York

Figures released by V. A. Hall, Returning Officer for the Riding of North York following the official count last Tuesday showed the majority for Col. W. P. Mulock, member elect for this riding, to be 1815. The active service vote gave Mulock 66 and Dix 104. This made the Mulock total vote 10,648 and the Dix total 8,833.
