Forgotten and neglected for many decades is one of York County's oldest cemeteries, serving as a place of

moved to a more suitable location in the village, where it was reconstructed and remodelled extensively to serve as the present Thornhill United Church.

Since that time, the cemetery has no longer been used, being almost forgotten by the older villagers and unknown to the younger people in the district.

Strange as it may seem, the oldest | mond Hill. tombstone in the entire cemetery remains in almost perfect condition. Its inscription dates back to 1837 and bears the name "Abigail Marwood," whose death preceded that of her husband, William Marwood, by 10 years.

the tombstones can be linked with Richmond Hill 45r33. the War of 1812 and the eventful Mackenzie Rebellion in 1837.

The names Pearson, Hewgill, Marwood, Atkinson and others, found inscribed on the grave stones, are commonly found throughout the immediate district and the County of York, but it is quite possible that many bearing these names are not aware of the location of their ancestors' resting place, which has been forsaken.
