## MARKHAM TOWNSHIP COUNCIL

Sitting as a Court of Revision at an adjourned session Monday afternoon the appeals of residents of the Langstaff sub-division district for reductions in assessments. After a careful study of the situation and a clear and detailed explanation of all particulars by assessor Walter Craig, it was decided to dismiss the appeals.

A petition from residents in the Markham Road-Richmond Hill neighbourhood protested against the rebuilding of the Brillinger barn, recently destroyed by fire. The Sanitary Inspector and Building Inspector were instructed to investigate the complaints and report to the Township Board of Health.

A request from Thornhill Police Village trustees re the paving of John Street from Yonge Street a distance of a mile and a quarter was considered at length by council. The cost to the township under the proposed plan would be about \$6000. Reeve Rennie and members of council pointed out that the Township budget for the year had been drawn up and that it would be difficult to make provision for such a large expenditure at this late period of the year. Owing to existing conditions the trustees were asked to leave the petition over for another year at least.

Total building permits for May totalled \$28765 and included seven new dwellings to cost \$27,700, alterations to dwellings \$700, and other buildings \$365.

Relief accounts for the month of May totalled \$365.80.

General accounts passed included \$697 for Calcium purchased to be used as dust layer in various parts of the municipality.
