Sitting as a Court of Revision at an adjourned session Monday afternoon Markham Township council dismissed the appeals of residents of the Langstaff sub-division district for reductions in assessments. After a careful study of the situation and a clear and detailed explanation of all particulars by assessor Walter PATTERSON ESTATE VALUED AT Craig, it was decided to dismiss the

building of the Brillinger barn, recently destroyed by fire. The Sanitary Inspector and Building Inspector were instructed 'to investigate the complaints and report to the Township Board of Health.

The cost to the township under the proposed plan would be about \$6000. 
