All guns and revolvers found in the homes of these Italians and Germans should be immediately confiscated, in the opinion of councillors.

Both these resolutions will be forwarded to the Minister of National Defense and the Prime Minister at once. Attached to them will be a rider that naturalization of all enemy aliens be stopped at once.
