## Keep on Producing What You Have Produced, Gardiner, To Farmers.

Minister of Agriculture says war effort does not require rapid switching from one product to another

Canada's Agricultural Policy in relation to its war effort was disclosed by Hon. J. G. Gardiner at some length in discussions in the House of Commons during the week. When war came, he pointed out, there was in Canada considerable surpluses of most farm products. There was a very large surplus of wheat and even now it is the largest in history. There are also large surpluses of pork and dairy products at the present time.

Mr. Gardiner said that those who have studied the situation estimate that larger quantities of products would be required next summer because of the enlistment of farm hands in the army and other causes.

What should the farmer produce? The Minister of Agriculture answered this question by these words. "We have been constantly saying, and we think it is the proper thing to say, that the farmers of Canada can best serve the interests of Canada and the interests of the Allies, by continuing to produce those staple products which they were producing before the war started. That is in so far as they were producing wheat they should continue to produce wheat. In so far as they were producing different types of live stock they should continue to do so."

There might be some difficulty in marketing some of the less staple products such as fruit even during the later years of the struggle in which we were engaged, the Minister thought. There certainly would be difficulty during the earlier years. But the Government felt that those who had been engaged in the production of staple products should continue because those were the products which were going to be most needed through the war period. "If possible they should try to do it to better effect," he said. "They should try to produce a better product and a little more of that product if they can, but they should not attempt to switch rapidly from the production of one thing to the production of another."
