## OBITUARY

LATE HENRY MOYLE

A lifetime crusader against the evils of the liquor and opium traffic, a staunch churchman and keen student of social problems and public affairs, Henry Moyle died at his home here Sunday, July 14th, after an illness of about four months. Born on a farm on the Brantford-Paris road he spent the early part of his life in agriculture, later moved to Toronto, and has lived in Richmond Hill since 1915. Throughout his lifetime he was closely associated with the church and with every movement whose object was the furtherance of temperance. He made an extensive study of the opium traffic and devoted much time and means in an effort to stamp it out. He was a keen student of public affairs and staunch supporter of the Liberal party. Agricultural problems were always the subject of his thought and study, and his whole life was one freely devoted to public service.

His wife, Annie Davies, daughter of the late William Davies, died in 1892, and he is survived by three sons, Dr. Robert D. Moyle of Eastbourne, England, William D.
