### Trade and War

Capacity to produce is affected by our ability to import. Modern industry represents the importation of raw materials which can be produced more cheaply abroad than at home. It would be folly at a time like his to waste effort by producing in Canada a product which we could obtain more cheaply - that is with less cost in human effort - by producing something else and exchang-

ing it for the things we need. "Raw material" in the sense in which it is here used, means products used in Canadian factories in the production of other products. Steel is a finished product, but it is the raw material of shipyards and raw material for tanks.

The lack of ability to import due to the stranglehold of the British navy, forces Germany and Italy to expend far more labour power in production than either country would be compelled to devote to this purpose under normal conditions.

In war we seek to produce more with less effort. Our blockade of the axis powers compels them to reverse this process - to produce less with more effort. The measure of change in this connection is shown by a total increase in our imports in the first six months of this year, of \$175,000,000 the increase in exports was \$145,000,000. The figures for June, the last month available, show an increase of \$34,500,000 in merchandise exports and \$27,000,000 in imports. There was also a substantial increase in exports of nonmonetary gold.

Canadian trade, despite war, moves upward and helps to carry the burden of the war. The increased demand for labour has led to the National Registration - the hope is to speed up production by drawing more men into the army of workers. Many more will be needed. The war is not yet over.

## With Military Display Over Petawawa Hills

The crash of heavy artillery and the rumble of mechanical transports echoed through the wooded hills of 1928 CHEV. COUPE; 1929 Ford Petawawa when Lord Athlone, Canada's new Governor-General, accompanied by Princess Alice, visited the big training centre.

It was His Excellency's first inspection of a Canadian military camp and the series of special displays arranged for his benefit testified to the vast strides made by the Dominion's fighting forces since the outbreak of war eleven months ago.

Bronzed fighting men, trim in their summer uniforms and sun helmets, staged realistic mock battles for the Vice-Regal party. At other points along the route taken by their Excellencies displays demonstrating practically every activity of an armed force, from bridge building to

was a sham battle in one of Petatwawa's wide valleys. The Vice Regal party, together with high military officers, watched the show from No. 7 Highway. 'a special stand constructed on the side of a hill.

More than a mile from the observation stand was a dummy village with the flag of the "enemy" flapping from a steeple.
