**Pte. Peter Walker  
Describes Soldier  
Life in Old England**

The following interesting letter was received by Stan Ransom from Peter Walker, formerly of this district and will be of interest to his many friends:

Somewhere in England,  
August 18, 1940.  
"Well here we are in Aldershot but that is all I can tell you, but I will tell you I certainly enjoyed myself on the trip across. It was so smooth and calm, not a rough hour on the sea and the trip down here when we landed in a Scottish port was fine. We got 5 days leave after we were here 2 days and I took a trip up to the north of Scotland and oh boy did I enjoy it. Up there and in England too nearly all you can see working in the fields is women, driving teams, tractors, binders, drawing out manure and everything a man can do. The women here are certainly brave, we have to raise our hats to them. I have had a few letters from the Hill this week and glad to have them, a letter is welcome here at any time. Well I am liking army life fine so far. They feed us good and we have good quarters to live in and what could a man want better. Only Jerry disturbs us once in a while when he drops an egg or two nearby but otherwise it's very quiet. Did you hear us broadcasting just as we left Canada also again when we landed at a Scottish port? You remember the last time I got a hair cut we were joking among ourselves about the British Navy. But Stan after what I saw coming across, we have really got to thank God Britain has a navy. Some of the boys got a little home sick but they are getting over it now and like it better. We are leaving here tomorrow to get into hard work which I will enjoy and also see a bit of the country.  
Well this will be all for now. Enclosed is a sprig of Heather from the Hill of Alvak in the north of Scotland. Hoping to hear from you. I suppose by the time you get this letter the Euchre parties will be thinking of starting up again but I am sorry I won't be able to attend any of them this winter as business will be too pressing. Give the boys I know my best respects. Best regards to Mrs. Ransom, yourself and family.

PRODUCE 15,000,000 POUNDS  
OF VITAL WAR MATERIALS**

Vital war materials totalling fifteen million pounds have been produced by Dominion Textile Company in the first year of the war, the management states. These materials include anti-gas cloth, airplane cloth, camouflage netting, heavy duck for gun covers, and tents, tarpaulin duck and duck for kit bags and bandoliers.

Other lines are khaki flannel and drab flannel shirting, drill shirting and summer battle dress cloth of three kinds — for troops, air force and officers. Yarns for toques, mitts, underwear and sweaters, as well as tire cord for mechanized equipment and fabric for ground sheets and palliasses are among the articles produced.
