Local Committee Hopes to Further Sale of War Stamps

Poster Contest Announced for Public and High Schools

A meeting of the local committee to encourage the sale of War Savings Stamps met at the Municipal Hall Tuesday evening under the chairmanship of J. A. Greene and discussed ways and means of increasing local sales. E. D. Cunningham, Centre Street West was named as secretary-treasurer of the local organization.

The objective of the "Smash Hitler" campaign being conducted throughout Canada, is to enlist an army of savers in support of Canada's war effort. A National committee has been set up, and voluntary organizations are being formed in every community.

Tuesday night the local committee decided to offer prizes in both the public and High Schools for the best posters designed to encourage the sale of stamps. The contest will close November 1st. Local merchants will be asked to have War Savings Stamps on sale at their places of business, and clubs and local organizations will be encouraged to give stamps as prizes.

Many requests are being made these days on the pocket-book of the Canadian people. In Germany, demands are made. We are therefore thankful that our country has not deteriorated to the point of a similar practice. Canadian people realize their duty to their Government, and have even asked the question:

"How can we be of further help?" To answer this is quite simple. "By investing in War Savings Stamps and Certificates to the utmost of your ability."

To explain it otherwise, the Government merely asks you to SAVE FOR SECURITY, in order that the war issue may be brought to a successful conclusion; and further, you will have built up for yourself a reserve fund, in anticipation of a lessening of trade activity at the end of the war.

Junior Farmers Plowing Contest

The York County Junior Farmers' 20th annual Home Plowing Competition will take place during the last week of October and entries for same must reach the Department of Agriculture, Newmarket, before Thursday, October 24th.

This competition is open to all Junior Farmers and young men in the County of York under 30 years of age. Plowing must be done on the home farm or on the farm where competitor is working or on an adjoining farm not more than one mile distant. Three acres must be plowed in tractor classes and two acres in walking plow classes, except Class 5 for Boys 16 years and under, 1½ acres.

A very attractive list of prizes is offered and these prizes will be presented at a banquet for the competitors and their friends, place and date of which will be announced later.
