now in Bermuda) rarest books "Legatio Babylonica", published in Spain in 1511. Its actual discovery and naming of the Islands are shrouded in mystery. Weil known to early Spanish navigators Bermuda was chartered as the northern mark of the storied Plate Fleet, and many a Spanish treasure galleon was wrecked on the coral reefs off shore.

The most artistic of the many tablets is that erected to the memory of Governor Wm. Campbell who died of fever December 1796, a few days after his arrival. The sculptor was John Bacon, a prominent member of the Royal Academy. Bacon was buried in Westminster Abbey. Mrs. Campbell, on her return to England, became governess to the Prince of Wales children. The Communion set dates back to Charles I 1625-26, and a larger Chalice name Frances Garthom figure of Britannia Wm. III 1697-98. The service began with the Old Hundred and consisted of shortened evensong with sermon by the Rector and concluded with the Hymn "Now thank we all our God."


