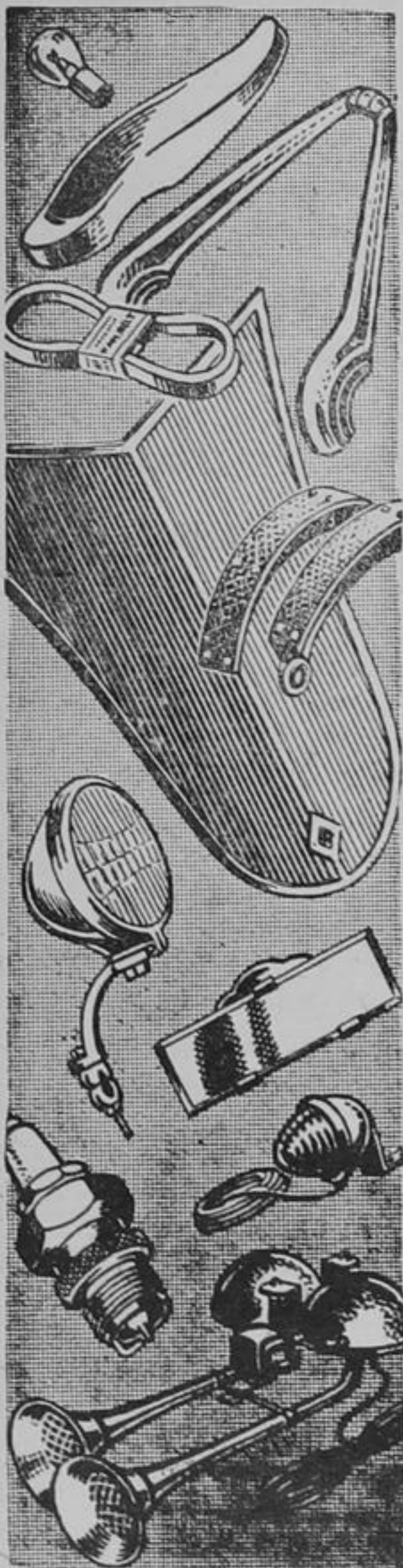

Hold Short Courses In Thirteen Counties

Expect 325 rural boys and 250 girls to attend courses sponsored by Ont. Dept. of Agriculture, Jan. 7 to 31st.

Short courses in agriculture for rural boys will be held from January 7 to 31 in thirteen counties, R. S. Duncan, Director of Agricultural Representatives, Ont. Dept. of Agriculture announces. Short courses for rural girls in Home Economics will be held at the same time. An attendance of 325 boys and 250 girls is expected.

Lectures and practical work for the boys will be under the supervision of Mr. Duncan and the Agricultural Representatives in the counties, while the Home Economics course will be under the direction of Miss F. P. Eadie, Women's Institute Branch, Ont. Dept. of Agriculture, and Home Economic coaches.

Courses have been arranged for the following counties: Durham; Hampton; York County, Unionville; South Simcoe, Bradford; Peel, Ebezezer; Haldimand, Hagersburg; Brant, Brantford; Middlesex, Lucan; Lambton, Forest; Perth, Atwood; Wellington, Mt. Forest; Grey, Kilsyth; Waterloo, Wellesley; Dundas, Chesterville. There will be no course for girls in South Simcoe.

Mr. Duncan said there would be a series of five special meetings during the month in the counties of Dufferin and Halton.

Boys and girls in the above counties who would like to take these courses should write or telephone their agricultural representative or Home Economics coach.
