Dealing with village affairs he pointed out that much of the money raised by local taxation was for uncontrollable expenditure. When the rate for the year was struck, a careful survey of the estimates resulted in an increase in taxation this year of three mills. This was due to increased requisition for High School maintenance and to make provision for payment of \$1000 overdraft in the bank at the close of last year and \$2500 in notes to private parties. We had no alternative but to make a levy for this money if we were to pay our obligations, and we believe in the policy of meeting our obligations as we go

During the year a change was made in the superintendent of the waterworks, and the Chairman paid tribute to the efficient work being done by the present engineer. Mr. Stirling.
