WOODBIDGE

According to reports issued from Ottawa by the Department of Munitions and Supply, contracts awarded during the week ending January 10 included a \$5,699 contract to W. Robinson and Son Converters, whose mill is located at Woodbridge.

A detailed report supplied by Woodbridge Red Cross Secretary, Mrs. Leo Watson, shows that the following articles made up the 1294 completed during 1940: For men on active service, 450 pair socks, 34 pair wristlets, 17 sleeveless sweaters, 16 scarves, 1 pair gloves, 8 helmets, 6 pair two-way mitts, 3 pair seamen's socks, 462 khaki handkerchiefs, total 997; for refugees, 20 children's nightgowns, 14 boys dressing gowns, 1 pair pyjamas, 4 pair children's bloomers, 5 children's sweaters, 7 quilts, 37 pair children's mitts, 2 pr. blankets, total 90; for hospitals, 60 surgical towels, 84 ice bag covers, 20 bed gowns, 12 surgeon's gowns, 31 pillow cases, total 207.

Indirectly aiding Canada's war effort by increasing U.S.-dollar exchange in Canada, another large shipment of pure-bred Ayrshire cattle left Woodbridge railway yards last week for the U.S. The shipment, which included Ayrshires from many parts of Ontario, was arranged by James Elliot, local Ayrshire specialist. Owner of a large herd on his farm near here, Mr. Elliot is proud of the fact that his organizing efforts are bringing into Canada thousands of dollars in U.S. currency. He explains that every car leaving here adds \$2000 or \$3000 of American currency to aid our war effort. The most recent shipment was gathered from farms near Kitchener, Waterloo and many other points in southern Ontario. Assembled at Woodbridge the pure-bred cattle were re-shipped to Ohio where they are distributed by Frank Lyle of Belfountain. Mr. Lyle was a visitor in Woodbridge last week and later Mr. Elliot left for Sarnia to arrange further shipments.

RIVERS OF PACIFIC GIVE GREAT FISHING

But the Best "Steel Heads" Are in B.C. Streams

Victoria, Jan. 18—Steelhead trout fishing is just about at its best now in Vancouver Island's famous game-fish rivers. Steelheads are the largest and best fighters of the true trout family. They are found only in the waters of the Pacific coast, from Alaska to California, but the fishing is best in Vancouver Island's east coast streams and in the Fraser Valley and Vancouver districts on the mainland. They can be taken with various lures and they always give a good battle, whether they are only five or six-pounders or the huge 12 and 15-pound giants that delight the sportsman's heart. Fishing for salmon is also good in the winter, in sheltered bays and inlets. Victoria is enjoying unusual popularity this year. It is only in recent years that Vancouver Island has been "discovered" as a warm-weather resort and the growing tourist traffic has been given a sudden impetus by the war. The weather is running its usual course, averaging between 45 and 50 degrees above zero, and golfing, riding, hiking and other sports are finding increased numbers of devotees. Preparations are already well advanced for the Empress Winter Golf Tournament, the big sports event of the year. It will be held from March 9 to 15 on the seaside Oak Bay course.

DRAYTON DEPLORES LACK OF SACRIFICE

Little or no war sacrifice has been evident in Canada and Canadians are hoarding some \$900,000,000 which should be in circulation, Sir Henry Drayton told the publicity division of the Toronto district war savings committee Saturday.

"With the exception of those who have contributed their sors to the fighting forces, little or no war sacrifice has been evidenced," said Sir Henry. "Nothing has been done voluntarily to contribute to our war effort."

Sir Henry warned against over-confidence, declaring that while it was necessary for the public to have confidence in themselves, too much of this spirit was a bad thing "because they can fail to realize the extent of their duty." If every home has its quota of war savings certificates it would go far toward alleviating the difficulties of post-war adjustment," said the speaker.

"I have figures of Oct. 31, 1939, before the earning power was swollen by war industries, which shows deposits amounting to more than a billion dollars and accounts of \$1000 or less represented 92 per cent of the whole."

FROZEN RADIATORS ARE WAR MENACE

Putting anti-freeze into the radiator is a patriotic act in Britain now, Science Service reports. Contrarywise, letting one's car freeze up is denounced as aid and comfort to the enemy, by the English motorists' journal, Modern Transport.

In times of peace, the journal's editor remarks, it is nobody's business but the motorist's if he lets his car freeze up and perhaps incurs serious damage to the engine. Now, however, "such carelessness is definitely unpatriotic, for the work entailed in getting the vehicle back into service makes an unnecessary call on the national effort. It means that labor and material must be diverted from some other task in order to effect the repair. It is for this reason that the Minister of Transport has issued a reminder that during this winter it will be more than ever necessary to take precautions against damage by frost."
