During the year there were 4 Directors meetings and one illustrated lecture on Flower Arranging. Four shows were held and the total number of entries was 330, exhibitors 79, value of cash prizes \$83.11. The membership for 1940 was 100. 41 orchards were sprayed and all but two accounts are paid, one of the two in arrears for two years and I would recommend that no spraying be done for any person in arrears. Premiums consisting of Iris, Gladiolus and Perennials were distributed to the value of \$18.26. Twenty trees at a cost of ten dollars were planted on village streets. The park and the boulevard at the entrance to the village were again cared for. The long flower bed in the park was planted in perennials, the plants being donated by members. Total expenditure on civic improvements \$146.96.

The fifth annual Bridge was held in the High School Gym and while the attendance was small the evening was a financial success, thanks to the work of the ladies of the refreshment and attendance committee and the ability of our auctioneer.

A service diploma was awarded to Mrs. A. J. Hume in recognition of her long and valuable work as secretary-treasurer.

The secretary would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who donated money, labour or prizes to the society the past year. Their help is of great assistance in carrying on the work. The work of the society in this and past years warrants the support of every lover of flowers, trees and beautiful home surroundings in the village. ### VAUGHAN TAX PAYMENTS UP FOR PAST YEAR

Relief Shows Substantial Drop — Council Gets a Bouquet From Satisfied Taxpayer

Eighty-two point seven per cent of the 1940 tax levy for Vaughan Township was paid by the end of the year, Clerk and Treasurer J. M. McDonald reported to the regular meeting of Vaughan Township council Monday afternoon. This is a little higher percentage than in 1939. In fact tax payments have consistently improved since 1936 when the percentage paid by the end of the year was 76.5. The total levy in 1940 was \$87,978.67 and of this \$72,765.14 was paid by December 31st. The report showed the arrears as to the various concessions. The largest amount of arrears are in concession one, \$2,731.58 and the smallest in concession eleven, \$10.44.

Relief expenditure in 1940 was very materially reduced amounting to only \$7,946.99 compared with an expenditure of \$24,458.02 in 1936. Comparative relief figures for 1940 and 1936 are as follows:

Relief administration costs in the Township which were \$1325 in 1936 were reduced to \$325 in 1940. Relief expenditure for 1941 has been estimated at \$4,875.00. The saving to the ratepayers of Vaughan in 1940 as compared with 1936 amounted to about one and a quarter mills in taxation.

Council passed the necessary by-law to provide \$1800 requested by Langstaff School section for alterations to the school. The money will be loaned to the Section by the Clergy Reserve Fund at the rate of 5 per cent. It will be repaid in 6 annual instalments of \$354.63.

### MARKHAM PLANS TO SPEND \$26,000 ON ROADS IN 1941

Road expenditure in Markham Township in the year 1940 totalled \$26,187.01 and at the regular monthly meeting of the council held at Unionville Monday council made application to the provincial government for subsidy on this amount.

R. J. Stiver was appointed Weed Inspector for the west half of the Township at a salary of \$165 and J. W. Warriner for the east half at \$100.

Road expenditure for 1941 was estimated at \$26,000, practically the same as in 1940. It is divided as follows: Construction \$3000, bridge \$1000, machinery \$2500, superintendent's salary \$1500, maintenance and repairs \$18,000.

Accounts passed included: \$181.60 for snow plowing, Bituminous Spraying Co. for mounting snow plow, \$47.66. Relief accounts amounted to \$318.29.
