Beef Ring Has 50th Birthday

The fiftieth birthday of part King and Vaughan Beef Ring Association was held in King Masonic Hall on Jan. 22 with councillor Cameron E. Walkington, the secretary-treasurer, as chairman. In March 1891 the association was formed with the sixteen required members, under the leadership of its founders, William Walkington and Neil Malloy. Mr. Charles Nixon became president, Mr. Malloy secretary and Mr. Walkington treasurer and butcher. Rules and regulations governing the association were patterned after those of Eversley Beef Ring formed in 1890 but now extinct.
