Wages would be paid by the farmer according to the worth of the man, and local wage scale.

It is proposed to issue registration cards to business men and factory workers willing to help. These cards would be sent to Alex. Maclaren, Dept. of Labor, Parliament Buildings, Toronto, who in turn would have them indexed and sent

Requests for help would be sent by the farmer to the Agricultural Representative vho would turn over the request to the small community committee having the names of all men available and the day of the week convenient for them to work.

The C.S.T.A. is confident that urban dwellers will aid the farmer when they are impressed with the bald fact that "we can't fight if we can't eat", and that through co-operation and organization Ontario's crops this year can and will be harvested without loss.
