

> DISTRICT POSTAL DIRECTOR SPEAKER AT LIONS CLUB

A. M. Gibson, Toronto District Postal Director was the speaker at the regular meeting of the Richmond Hill Lions Club last Thursday evening. Reviewing the postal history of Canada the speaker pointed out that the first Post Office was opened in Canada in 1857, and today there are over 12,500 Post Offices serving the people of Canada. The first rural mail delivery was in 1908 and today in Canada there are over 4500 mail routes serving the rural sections of the Dominion. The introduction of Air Mail has speedily developed since first introduced in 1927, and today there are eleven mails daily from the airport at Malton. Mr. Gibson told of the new mail via the air routes. To conserve space and reduce weight, soldiers letters are photographed and carried by plane in film form, and redeveloped to their natural size before delivery. In this way thousands of letters are carried in the very small space of a roll of film.
