DESTROY These Noxious Weeds Sow Thistles--Ox-eye Daisy--Wild Mustard--Bind Weed--Blue Weed--Pepper Grasses--Bladder Campion--Hawkweeds--Stinkweed--Canada Thistle--Common Milkweed--White Cockerle--Wild Carrot--Wild Lettuce--Common Ragweed--Dodder--Common Burdock--Poison Ivy--Chicory--Docks--Russian Thistle --Tumbling Mustard--Cinquefoils--Spurges.
