 Rev. Dr. W. J. MacTaggart, chairman of the Toronto Centre Presbytery presided, assisted by Rev. Alex. Habert of Newtonbrook and Rev. S. J. Mathers of St. James-Bond, Toronto.  
 Mr. Ha'bert gave the message from Isaiah, Chap. 40, with the text thought, "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength." Thinking of Canada, Just now, we are called to dwell upon a higher patriotism, which places God at the centre of the nation's mind and heart. God is the best thing for Canada and the Empire, the preacher emphatically pointed out. With a new vision of patriotism and success, and with Christ as the centre of that vision, we would be able to realize peace, righteousness and the Kingdom of God in the world. "The chief place in the nation belongs to God," he concluded.  
 Dr. MacTaggart then performed the induction ceremony.  
 Rev. Mr. Mathers delivered the charge to the minister and the congregation leaving no doubt as to the clearness of the honour and duty imposed upon each.  
 "And all things are of God, who hath reconciled us to himself by Jesus Christ, and hath given to us the ministry of reconciliation," as the text chosen. "The ministry of reconciliation implies that as we live in brotherhood we set an example before the world. In social and business life; our attitude towards education; in political actions, we manifest the principle of reconciliation; so much so that the life of the church and even the 'Master' is judged. The minister, said Mr. Mathers, does the work of the church, he is responsible to the church of God, and he has certain duties to perform in the church at large.  
 Dr. MacTaggart escorted Rev. Mr. Anderson to his place in the pulpit and the newly inducted minister announced the closing hymn and pronounced the benediction.

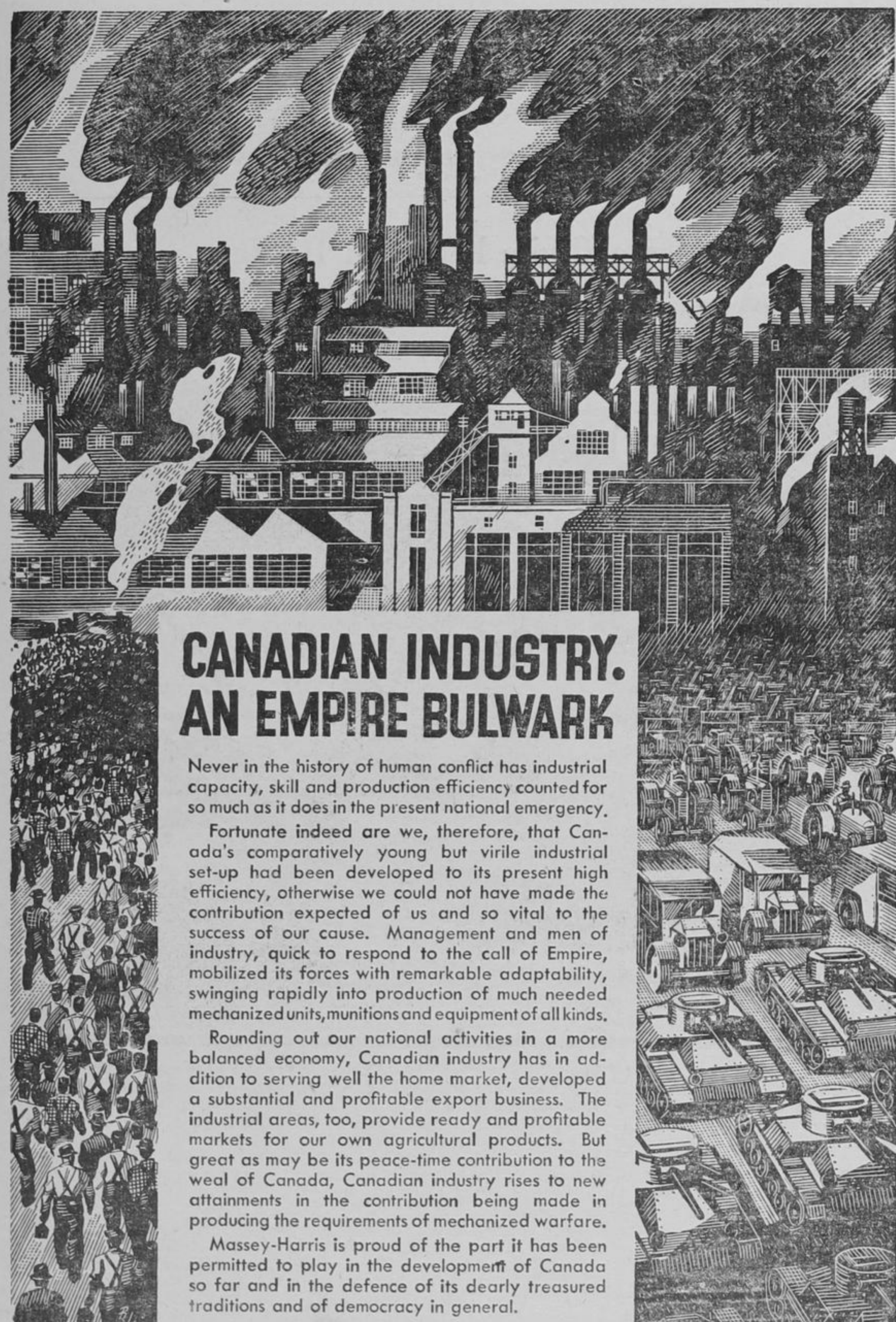
**Skinner-McBride**
