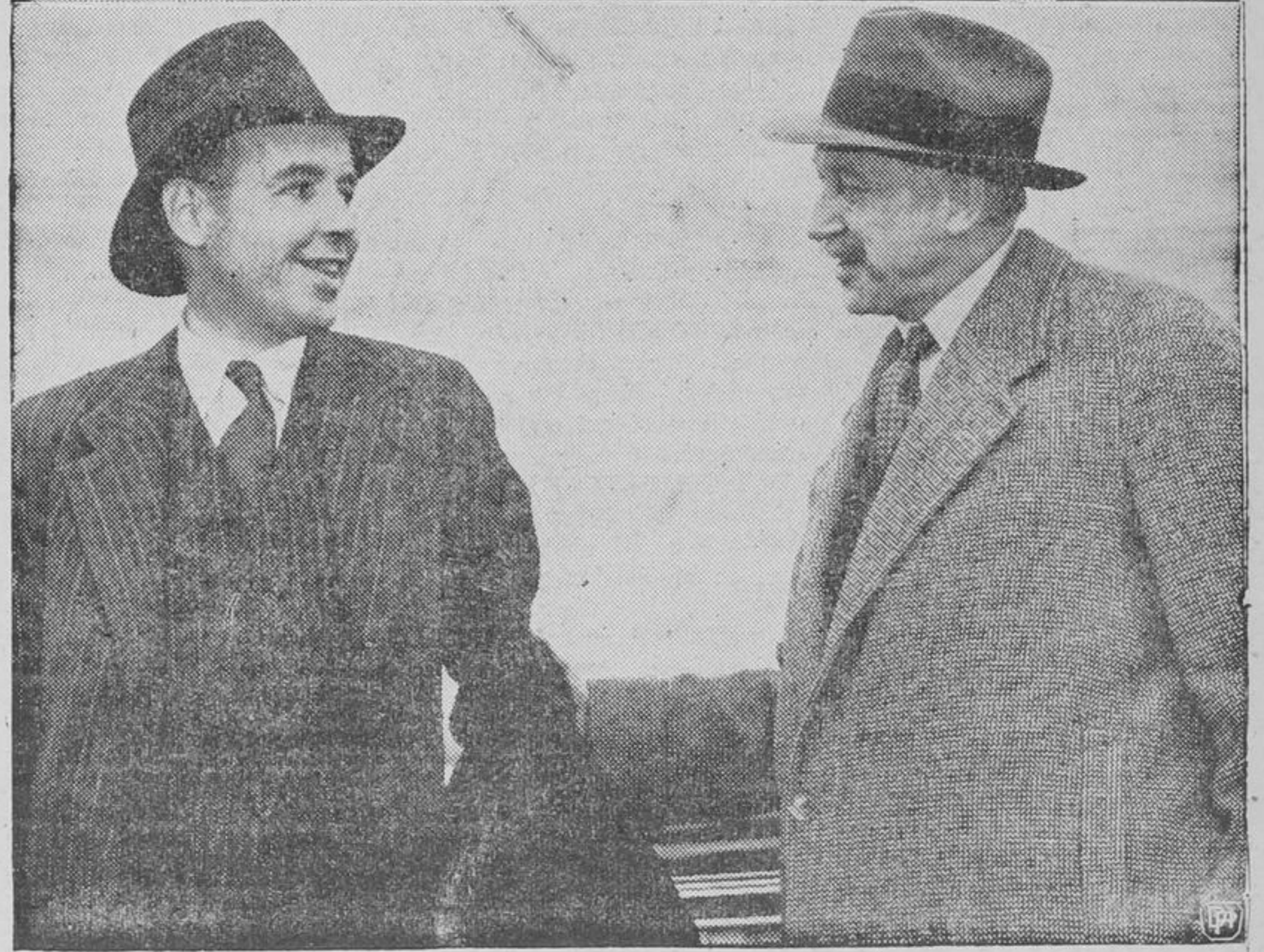
### ELGIN MILLS
