400 PHEASANTS LET LOOSE IN VAUGHAN

Prospects for Pheasant hunt-* ing in Vaughan took an upward * boost this week when 400 birds * were let loose. The birds, mostly full grown, were distributed * in various parts of the township by constables Deferrari and Ireland. Pheasant hunting licenses are now on sale by the Township Clerk at Maple and the number available is limited. *

STILL STUDYING WATER SUPPLY PROBLEM

Development of the additional Richmond Hill water supply is at a standstill pending further investigation. The estimated cost of pump, motor and starter to pump water from the new well directly into the main is \$5,250. If the water has to be filtered before it enters the main it will mean a substantial, outlay in addition. The alternative to building a filter at the new well would be to construct a main to the present pumping station which would probably cost about \$10,000.

VAUGHAN CONSIDERS FOX BOUNTY

To combat the danger of the increasing number of foxes and thus preserve the pheasants Vaughan Township council are considering the proposal of a bounty. It is proposed to give a bounty of \$2.00 to every hunter licensed to hunt in the municipality if he shoots a fox.
