Son of Mr. and Mrs. G. Harvey Jackson of Gadsby, Alberta, and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Saigeon of Maple who was killed in a motor accident near Hamilton September 16th. The funeral was held at Gadsby Monday, September 22nd and the service held in the church was attended by a company of 29 air force men, members of the Calgary Tank Regiment, members of the local Legion and a gathering of sympathetic friends which more than filled the church. Six members of the Air Force acted as pallbearers. His home town paper in paying tribute to the deceased airman said "Sgt. Gordon Jackson had a brilliant future ahead of him as he was a born mechanic, keen on his job and his promotion had come early in his service. He was a clever lad, a good son, and one who was very popular with his fellows." The Liberal extends sympathy to his parents, his brothers and sister at Gadsby and his grandparents and other relatives in the Maple district.
