**Report of Crop Conditions
Throughout Province Shows
York County Highly Favored**

In Some Sections Too Much Rain, In Others Too Dry —
Grain Crop Below Winter Feeding Requirements
— Fall Wheat Looks Fine

Ontario Potato Crop Averages 61.4 Cwt. Per Acre

The amount of rainfall received in all sections of York County during September and the first three weeks of October has been generous with the result that pastures and root crops made excellent growth. In some parts of Ontario it has been too dry but in Northern Ontario there has been altogether too much moisture. In some of these northern districts harvest could not be completed and potatoes are lying in the ground rotting.

Threshing is now completed in old Ontario and the quality of spring grains is excellent but the volume is considerably below winter feeding requirements and it is anticipated large quantities of grain will have to be brought into the province. The decrease in hay and grain production in Ontario has forced farmers to reduce purchases of feeder cattle and will tend to restrict any increase in hog numbers.

The acreage sown to fall wheat shows a considerable increase over last year and in York County the crops look fine. In some parts of Ontario weather was too dry in September for best germination and growth. Although there are some fine root crops in Vaughan, Markham, King and Whitechurch it is stated that on the whole the production of mangels and turnips will be below average.

Silo filling is now completed and the average yield for the province is 9.79 tons with a total production of 3,466,000 tons, several hundred thousand tons more than in 1940. Harvesting of the late potato crop is well advanced with the yield

ranging from good in some sections to low in other parts of old Ontario. The difference in yield is accounted for by varying soil and weather conditions as well as the fact that many fields were poorly cultivated on account of the shortage of labour. The dry weather, with much sunlight during the last few weeks of September prevented the development of late blight, and the quality of the potato crop is the best that has been produced for a number of years.

Damage from August frosts did not cover a large area, and the loss in the aggregate was small. Harvesting of the late crop is now well advanced. The 1941 crop of Ontario potatoes is now estimated at 8,473,000 cwt. from 138,000 acres, or 61.4 cwt. per acre, as compared with 6,530,000 cwt. from 146,800 acres, or 46.0 cwt. per acre last year. Present prices to growers are considerably higher than those prevailing at this date a year ago.

In Northern Ontario some very high yields are being obtained this season, but extremely wet weather is delaying harvesting in the northwestern districts, and has caused some rot.

**Sixteen Boys
In Woodbridge
Calf Club Show**

Bert Livingston First With Holstein and Alan Bagg First With Jersey

The largest class of livestock shown at Woodbridge Fair was that of the Woodbridge Calf Club. Thirteen boys exhibited Holstein heifer calves and three boys exhibited Jersey heifers making a total of sixteen boys who competed for showmanship.

The judge, Durno Innes, of Woodstock, complimented the boys on a fine show. Bert Livingston, son of L. S. Livingston had first prize Holstein heifer, was first in showmanship and highest in total points on the Calf Club project. The next four highest placed Holstein calves, exhibited by Wesley Whittaker, Bruce, Alan Watson and Russell Watson, was one of the groups chosen to represent the club at the C. N. E.

Alan Bagg, son of George Bagg, was first with his Jersey heifer. He was also first with the same calf at the C.N.E. Donald Bagg and James Bagg also showed Jerseys and this group of three boys was first prize group at the Calf Club Competitions at the C.N.E.

The Kiwanis Scholarship winners are Bruce Snider, Wesley Whittaker and James Bagg. Bert Livingston and Donald Bagg, both higher ranking boys were not eligible to take the scholarship since they had previously won a scholarship. These scholarships are to the winter Short Course at Guelph, which if cancelled this year will be substituted in some way.

Wesley Whittaker won the leather calf halter donated by the York County Holstein Club. Bert Livingston had previously won one of these, so that it was awarded to the next highest boy in showmanship.

BIG FAIR BONERS
