722 farmers and junior farmers conduct 246 projects on 1590 acres in 44 counties and districts.

There will be a lot of interesting and valuable crop information released for the benefit of Ontario farmers when the 44 county and district branches of the Ontario Crop Associations hold their annual meetings. During the past summer, 722 1 Cook Stove with warming closet, farmers and junior farmers have cooperated with County Crop Improvement Associations in conducting 246 projects on 1,590 acres.

It has been found, for example, that no one variety of oats or barley can be recommended for all Ontario.
