Urge Fanning Mills Be Re-Conditioned Now

John D. MacLeod says now is time to repair farm machinery needed in all-out crop production for 1942.

It is good farm management during peace or war to plan for spring and summer work at this time of the year, says John D. MacLeod, Crops, Seeds and Weeds Branch, Ont. Dept. of Agriculture. The repairing of farm machinery is a job which can and should be done during the winter months. If the work is delayed until the spring rush, time and labour which could have been utilized during the winter months, will have to be diverted from other jobs requiring immediate attention. Difficulty in obtaining parts and repairs may be experienced and the all-out crop production program for Ontario farms for 1942 may be seriously affected.

The fanning mill will be the first implement to be required and should therefore be the first to be put in working condition. Screens, frames, fan blades, wind boards, castings, buckets, chains, etc. should be checked and the necessary parts and repairs ordered.

A shortage of zinc for screen material is anticipated and therefore, orders should be placed early. Each frame should fit snugly in the shoe, and screen material should be stretched tight and even on the frames. When not in use screens should be stored in a dry place, preferably on their side.

The mill should be set level and solid. The wind blast is regulated by the speed and uniformity at which the drive shaft is turned. When turning by hand a uniform speed is difficult to obtain. Regardless of what make of mill one may have it is possible to operate it with power. The job of turning the crank is out moded on many farms and a more satisfactory cleaning job can be accomplished by a power hook-up.

The advisability of two or more farmers purchasing a new mill or reconditioning an old one has possibilities which should be investigated. A pamphlet on "Seed Cleaning" which contains recommendations regarding screens for cleaning cereal crops, clovers and grass seed, and one on "The Operation of the Fanning Mill by Power", may be obtained by writing the Crops, Seeds and Weeds Branch, Parliament Buildings, Toronto.
