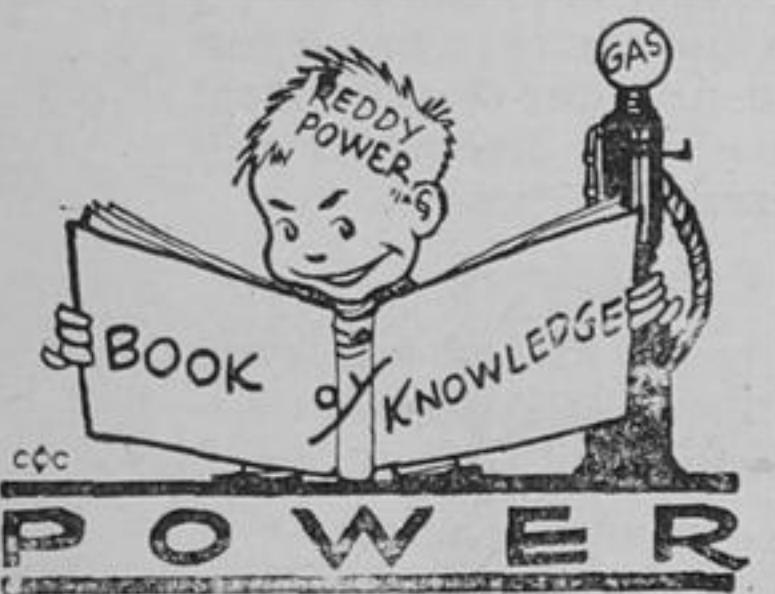

King Twp. Red Cross

During this month the King Township Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society is making an appeal for renewal of membership to all who have so nobly supported the work in the past. In order to carry on a considerable amount of money is required for the purchasing of materials for the various work groups throughout the Township.

The making of clothing and quilts for the Bomb Victims has become a very important part of the work of our women. We little realize the amount of supplies which have been shipped overseas by our Branch. A recent statement shows that during the past year 188 quilts, 67 dresses, 59 pullovers, 36 dressing gowns, 48 skirts, 27 pyjamas, 25 slips, 19 coats, 20 jumpers and blouses, 6 layettes, 26 pr. gloves, 8 lady's suits, 5 boys' suits, caps, helmets, knickers, cardigans and wraps were made in the Township and forwarded for the destitute in Britain.

And to our troops overseas: 65 pr. pyjamas, 22 sweaters, 15 turtle-neck sweaters, 25 sleeveless sweaters, 94 scarves, 613 pr. socks, 27 pr. seamen's boot stockings, 165 pr. mitts, 30 pr. gloves, also helmets, aero caps, wristlets and rifle-mitts.

With the war now spread to all parts of the world, the need for Red Cross supplies becomes ever greater. The ladies of the Branch hope to continue and expand their work during 1942. Your help is needed to provide the necessary funds. The need is great and we must prepare now for other emergencies as the war draws closer to our shores. Let's all lend a hand and by our membership dues help this great work to carry on.

After sleeping in one of his colony houses for close to two months, with a shotgun at his side, Percy Harris, a well-known Hensall district farmer, was able to market for Christmas trade close on to 1,000 turkeys, for which he was paid about the sum of \$4000. The raising of such a large flock was no easy task, but Mr. Harris accomplished it this season with the loss of only a few birds. On one occasion a few weeks ago, he was awakened by a disturbance among his flock, and, on investigation, he found three men approaching with empty sacks. An automobile was parked some distance away. The men, on being discovered, made a hasty getaway. The plucking of the feathers from the turkeys required a number of persons for several days.
