Farm Girls To Receive Badges for Farm Work

Will receive Farm Service Force insignia on registration, says Miss Florence P. Eadie.

Ontario farm girls are needed to produce food on the home farm this year says Miss Florence P. Eadie, director of Homemaking Club work for rural junior girls, Women's Institute Branch, Ont. Dept. of Agriculture. Farm girls, with village, town and city girls, will be called on this year as never before, to aid in the production of food.

Miss Eadie suggests that farm girls at home should now plan to assume responsibility for some particular work on the home farm this year. She should assign herself daily work which might include care of poultry and milking. Seasonal undertakings of importance would include the planting and weeding of the home vegetable garden. A physically fit and willing farm daughter could also help by driving horses or tractor and might assist in hoeing and other farm jobs.

Girls from 12 to 26 years of age who are at home on the farm may register for farm service with the Ontario Farm Service Force.

Application for registration should be made immediately to one of the following: leader of Homemaking Club; Secretary of Women's Institute; County Home Economic Coach or Florence P. Eadie, Women's Institute Branch, Ont. Dept. of Agriculture, Toronto.

The Ontario Dept. of Labor will issue Farm Service Force badges on completion of registration and certificates will be issued in Sept. to girls whose records show they have rendered National Farm Service.
