

It might help to remind farmers [and others who grow good winter apples that from now on through February is an ideal time to prune fruit trees. All branches and limbs removed should be cut close and painted and the bark will grow over the cut. All dead wood should be taken out, branches where too thick or growing into another. All fruit trees should be fertilized with manure at the roots and sprayed at the proper time. Tall trees should be cut down from the top, but not more than three feet and half in any one
