NO MAN CAN BE A GOOD LION AND NOT BE A GOOD CITIZEN

Of all Lions objects, the one that seems to be most transcendental, the one that seems to have the loftiest civic significance and most encouraging results, is contained in the clause: "to promote the theory and practice of the principles of good government and good citizenship."

A complete program is contained in this object of Lionism. It is a complete plan for our permanent attitude and for our persevering life-effort.

It is a very prevailing cry, something very easy and common, to voice the demand for our rights, at any cost, as citizens; but it is much too easy to overlook, if not to forget altogether, the duties that go along with our rights.

It is very true that a good citizen must be courageous enough to defend his rights. It is equally true that above all a good citizen is always obliged to discharge his duties.

One cannot be a good Lion without being a good citizen—one who is ready to serve the community, not only in purely material things and ways, but more so indeed in those things that contribute to build and elevate character and citizenship.

This being true, it is the duty of every Lion to give always a good example of respect for the laws of the land. We must reflect this mental attitude constantly, publicly and privately, by co-operating in the compliance of norms aiming at the development of the society in which we live.

In our business and professional activities; in our relations, legal or of any other nature, even in the simplest manifestations of our daily life, such as walking on the sidewalk, crossing the street, driving a car, attending a spectacle, etc., wherever we are, whatever we do—there must prevail in us all, that spirit of spontaneous co-operation, which is based on a well-understood respect for our rights and the rights of our fellow-men.

This conduct is what brings to the good citizen true prestige; not a deceiving "glittering tinfoil" prestige based on purely material values; but a prestige that means sincere respect and esteem, and loyal approval of the individual who enjoys it.

We must always persist in a sincere effort to impress upon everybody the fact that in every Lion must beat, and does beat, the heart of a good citizen!
