#### Sgt. Pilot George A. Davis Gives Life In Air Battle Over England on Feb. 11th

This district was saddened by another war casualty this week when word was received that Sgt. Pilot George Davis of the R.C.A.F., son of Rev. Douglas G. and Mrs. Davis of Stouffville United Church, formerly of King City, had been killed in action. Sgt. Pilot Davis lost his life on active service February 11th. He enlisted in the R.C.A.F. in November 1940 and received training at Toronto, Picton, Camp Borden and St. Catharines. He graduated from Dunnville as a pilot and received his wings on October 7, 1941 and a few weeks later was transferred to R.A.F. camp.

Sgt. Pilot Davis was born at Birch Cliff Heights in Scarboro on November 12, 1920. He attended public school at Smooth Rock Falls and King City and matriculated from Aurora High School. He was a good sportsman, excelling in basketball, softball and hockey. After graduation he was employed in the executive offices of the T. Eaton Co.

He was fully aware, as he left Canada with the R.C.A.F., that he had a "duty to perform". None would do that duty with more keenness and devotion.
