Bargain Seed Turns Out To Be Only Weed Screenings and Pedlar Faces Charge in Court

Experience of York County Farmers Emphasizes the
Importance of Buying Seed on Grade

The farmers of York County should take a warning from the news of last week's court proceedings at Newmarket where a free lance "seed pedlar" was haled to court by Constable Ronald Watt for selling what could only be called weed screenings as mixed clover and alfalfa seed. When sample of the seed was analyzed by the Dominion Department of Agriculture it revealed that it contained the following weed seeds per oz.: Bladder campion 64, Night-flowering catchfly 1120, Dock 48, Field peppergrass 16, Black medick 14656, Sweet Clover 1840, Sheep sorrel 32, Green foxtail 16 — 61.1% Weed seeds of all kinds.

While the salesman claims to have refunded the money to most of the purchasers, it is reported that two farmers were "prepared to take a chance on it". If this seed is sown at the rate of say 8 lbs. per acre it would mean sowing 8192 Bladder Campion seeds per acre alone and a total of 2,277,376 weed seeds of all kinds per acre, and what was supposed to be alfalfa was sweet clover. Perhaps these men will be complaining in a year or so that there is no money in farming and that the government should do something about it.

Farmers have been warned repeatedly not to take chances on ungraded clover seed and grass seeds in particular because few men are able to recognize the impurities including such bad weeds as Bladder Campion. It is illegal for this seed to be sold ungraded except for direct sales between farmers and even here the grading is a protection to both buyer and seller.

The local Agricultural Representative has always advised farmers to take no chances, and anyone wishing to know how the various grades of seeds compare as to purity should apply to W. M. Cockburn, Newmarket for a copy of the York County Seed Fair prize list which contains this information in a clear and concise form.

Incidentally the chap who sold this seed to one farmer at Schomberg, at least one at Colgan in Simcoe and a number in Peel County apparently posed as a cattle buyer but "happened" to have this seed which he would sell at a bargain (?). Now that his racket has been interfered with in that district, he and his accomplices might be expected to move to a new territory, so Mr. Farmer, be on your guard.

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Pasture Week Link In Cropping System

Good pasture will produce meat and milk four times cheaper than stable feeding says Norman Thomas of O.A.C.

"Pasture is the most important crop on any farm where a considerable portion of the cash receipts come from live stock and live stock products, but at present pasture is the weakest link in the cropping system of most Ontario live stock farmers," says Norman M. Thomas, Soil Specialist at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph.

"A well managed pasture produces digestible nutrients at lower cost than any other crop. It will also maintain our live stock for five months of the year without extra roughage. In fact, a good pasture will produce meat and milk three or four times cheaper than stable feeding."

"Good pasture is digested as easily as oilcake and is our cheapest source of protein. It is also high in essential minerals and vitamins which are necessary to maintain animals in healthy growing and producing condition."

"Since pasture is consumed directly by live stock there is little or no cost for labour and little loss of nutrients in harvesting. A good productive pasture also prevents soil erosion and adds fibre to our soils."

"Better pastures, economically produced, assure greater live stock profits, and conserve and improve soil fertility," states Mr. Thomas.
