Tested Recipes

SUGAR ECONOMY

Less sugar to eat; less sugar with which to cook. What does this mean to Canadian women? Everyone will now have another opportunity to help the war effort, knowing that she is being trusted personally to ration her family's sugar supply.

Most Canadian diets contain too much sugar. Homemakers will be assisting their families as well as their country when they use these recipes suggested by the Consumer Section, Marketing Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture.

Honey Cake

1/3 cup butter 1/2 cup honey 1/2 cup sugar 2 eggs 1/2 cup milk

1/2 teaspoon vanilla 2 cups cake flour

3 teaspoons baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt

Sift the dry ingredients. Cream the butter, add sugar gradually, creaming it thoroughly with the fat. Add honey gradually and blend with butter and sugar.

Beat egg yolks and add to first mixture. Add vanilla to milk. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with the milk, beating just enough to mix the ingredients. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into a tin eight inches square and bake in a moderate oven, about 350 F.

Gum Drop Cake

1 cup w. sugar 1/2 cup shortening 3/4 cup sweet milk

3/4 lb. light raisins lb. gum drops, no black ones 2 cups flour

1 tsp. baking powder 1/2 tsp. salt

Cut gum drops into flour, add raisins. Mix together and bake 11/2 hours in a slow oven.
