1 tsp. salt Minced parsley

Beat the eggs, add milk, then the cheese, crumbs, and salt. Pour into a buttered baking dish, set the dish in a pan containing an inch of hot water, and bake in a moderate oven until firm. Sprinkle the parsley over the top and serve from the baking dish.
