RICHMOND HILL FAIR DAY HAD FINE WEATHER, A RECORD CROWD AND BEST HORSE SHOW IN YEARS

93RD ANNUAL FAIR VOTED MOST ATTRACTIVE IN MANY YEARS — WAR CHARITIES HELPED BY SUCCESSFUL DANCE IN ARENA AT NIGHT

Richmond Hill Fair was held Monday and from start to finish it was a record breaker. Favored with warm sunshine the event attracted the largest crowd in many years, a record number of competitors were entered in the various classes, the quality of exhibits was excellent and the old time dance at night was attended by over one thousand people. The large crowd of visitors enjoyed the fine horse show program during the afternoon and expressed delight with every feature of the Fair.

Some of Canada's finest horses with the most skillful riders to be seen anywhere took part in the jumping events which delighted the large crowd throughout the afternoon. The ground was soft from recent rains but despite the poor footing there was some thrilling jumping contests for the many trophies.

The showing of light and heavy horses in the east ring was the best in many years. Many of Ontario's finest horses were on the grounds and in many classes the competition was very keen. Four teams competed in the roadster class and five teams were shown in the Percheron class. The James McLean Memorial Trophy for the best heavy team on the grounds was won by Heber Down of Brooklyn with his fine Clydesdales.

Games on the midway and refreshment booths did a rushing business and long before night the "sold out" sign was out. Wartime restrictions were reflected on the grounds in the absence of ice cream cones and the scarcity of bottled drinks. No ice cream was obtainable on the grounds and the pop supply was exhausted in the early afternoon.

The Sheep Shearing contest held in the arena after the Horse Show created much interest and will be made an annual feature of the Fair.

Big handsome Jack Thyne, The Kansas Farmer, in colorful costume topped with a five gallon hat roamed about the grounds and delighted the crowd with his old time fiddling, his cowboy songs and stories. Everywhere he went he was popular and was given a cordial reception. The Kansas Farmer will always be a welcome visitor at Richmond Hill Fair and we hope he'll be back next year.

An old time Fair Night Hoe Down was something new as a night feature and attracted a fine crowd. Over one thousand attended the dance in the arena and Billy Hole and his "Whoop and Holler" Kids provided a program of old time music which was thoroughly enjoyed. The famous Billy has lots of vim and vigor and he did a fine job of handling the night program. In between dances there was bingo and other attractions. The directors announced that one half of the proceeds of the night program would be divided between the Red Cross and the Telegram War Victims' Funds. As a result of the evening's success each of these worthy war charities was enriched by a cheque for \$60.00.

The day as usual was featured by the visit of many former residents of the district and the renewing of old acquaintances was a pleasing feature of the afternoon.

President F. S. Tyndall, speaking to The Liberal, expressed his delight with the success of the day and on behalf of the officers and directors of the Agricultural Society extended sincere thanks to all who contributed to the success of the Fair. "That includes not only those who attended, but also exhibitors, those who rented concessions, patronized the advertising columns of the program, gave donations, helped on committees, worked as judges, or in any way helped in making the day a success," said Mr. Tyndall. "It was a grand day," he said, "and the weatherman was very kind."

Large Congregation For Unveiling Of Honour Roll

St. Mary's Church, Richmond Hill, was filled to capacity on Sunday morning for the unveiling and dedication of the Honour Roll, containing the names of 32 members of the congregation now in the services of King and Country. The service in charge of the Rector, Rev. W. F. Wrixon, was colourful and inspiring. After the opening part of Morning Prayer, the Unveiling party which included the Reeve of Richmond Hill Mr. T. H. Trench, Mr. W. Adams, President of the Vaughan and Richmond Hill War Veterans, Wing Commander J. Aird representing the Air Force, Pte. R. Frisby representing the Army, two Scouts and the Churchwardens Mr. R. D. Little and Mr. W. J. Scrivener carrying their sticks of office, met the Rector at the chancel steps, where the Rector explained the design of the Honour Roll and read the names inscribed thereon. The party then proceeded to the back of the church where the Reeve unveiled the Honour Roll with the words, "With great pride and deep gratitude I unveil this Honour Roll recording the names of members of this congregation enlisted in the Services of our King and Country".
