## Short of Coffee ? Just Use Carrots

Five Richmond Hill "Farm Commandos" can vouch for the goodness of coffee made with the following recipe, which we hope will solve the rationing worries of many

#### Carrot Coffee

Cut carrots in very small cubes, place in thin layer in baking pan and dry in 275-300 degrees oven for about 1 hour, until rich brown in color but not burned. To make six cups of coffee use 3 teaspoons of the toasted carrot and 1 teaspoon of coffee, make in usual manner. May also be used without the addition of coffee.
