Mr. Maconachie had left his home in Hamilton last week to deliver a paper before the National Steel Institute of Pittsburgh. Mr. Maconachie was but 34 years old. He leaves a wife and two boys aged 8 and 4. He was the younger son of Rev. Canon and Mrs. G. R. Maconachie of Toronto. The funeral service will be held in Grace Churchon-the-Hill, Toronto, Friday at 12.30
