The myrtle warblers are still here in great numbers and an occasional Nashville warbler. Both kinglets - ruby-crowned and goldencrowned, tiny green grey birds with bright head markings are flitting about in the leaves and capturing many insects and larvae. The goldfinches are stripping seeds from cosmos and keeping up their continuous canary-like notes both when feeding and in flight. The downy woodpeckers are sampling pieces of suet, both old pieces from last winter and new ones just hung out.
