### Loan Sales Near Half Objective Nine Days To Go

Canada's Fourth Victory Loan Drive is progressing very favorably throughout all Canada, and North York is working steadily toward the objective of \$2,150,000. Sales up to Wednesday night in North York amounted to over \$1,000,000, a little short of half the objective with half of the campaign time elapsed.
