\$7000 Fire Razes Barn At Edgeley

Blaze Takes Toll of Clop - Maple Fire Brigade Responds - All Livestock Is Saved

Taking toll of over 1,500 bushels of this year's crop of wheat and oats and 60 tons of hay, fire believed to have originated in a straw stack destroyed one of the large barns on the farm of Alfred Bagg and Sons, at Edgeley Tuesday night. Loss was estimated at \$7,000.

Through the efforts of William Hawkworth, a farm employee who was engaged in milking at the time, 15 pure-bred Jersey cows and 10 calves were led to safety, while over a dozen pigs made their escape. No livestock was lost.

Fire Chief Les Laver, of Maple Fire Brigade, which responded to call sent through by the owner of the farm, attributed the cause of the fire to spontaneous combustion in a straw stack. The blaze spread to the 80 by 45 ft. bank barn before it was noticed.

Drawing on a cistern of water, the fire brigade concentrated its efforts on nearby buildings and was able to save a milk house. The firemen then stood guard for several hours to protect the house.

The property is on the "lower farm," one of three owned by Bagg and Sons, near Keele street, below No. 7 highway.

farmer of Vaughan Township, slept peacefully away after a linbering illness at his home on September 12th in his 79th year.
